Going mirror less!

I never thought that one day I would pack up my Canon DSLR gear and think about selling it! I must admit that carrying all that bulky gear around was starting to be a chore. I have always worked with a high end point and shoot camera, especially my beloved Canon G-11. It took great photographs and was smaller as compared to my DSLR camera. But it was limited with optics because the lens was not interchangeable. Then one day I was reading about the new mirror less camera by Olympus. It was about the size as my G-11, but you could change lenses like my DSLR. The lenses were even smaller than a comparable Nikon or Canon lens. This was what I was looking for, smaller size with the ability to change different lenses on the camera. But what about the lack of a mirror? How would this affect my photography? These were questions that I wanted to research before I would consider buying this type of camera. Because the camera lacks a mirror, manufacturers can make the body much smaller. Fewer moving parts means less vibration when taking a picture. Most DSLR macro photographers lock their mirror to eliminate vibration. This means that they cannot see out the viewfinder and are essentially blinded. The elimination of the mirror also means better video and "true live view" through the LCD. Newer DSLR's have live view, but the mirror can cause slower auto focusing when live view is used. I knew that I wanted

Follow these rules when submitting any image to the Coastal Camera Club:

Files must be named using the following format:

X#\$Coastal\$LastName\$FistName\$ImageTittle\$YYYY-MM.jpg

Where X=the type of file (Open, Digital Art, Black&White, etc) and YYYY-MM is the year and month of the event for which you are submitting the file. For example, O2\$Coastal\$Smith\$John\$The Red Barn\$2011-01, this is an image titled *The Red Barn* by John Smith of the Coastal Camera Club to be submitted to a competition in January of 2011.

Please remember the maximum size for competitions is 1024 pixels wide by 768 pixels tall. If the files are to be used in a club critique, they can be full size.

TIDBITS #82

One of the members of the hiking club I belong to (Meshomasic Hiking Club, Portland, CT) is a professional printer and photographer, subscribing to numerous photography magazines. When he is done reading them he passes them on to me. That got me to thinking just what is out there for the photographer to read, both as hard copy or online.

Doing my usual, I Googled photography publications and periodicals. In 0.26 seconds I received 1,630,000 hits. Thankfully Google arranges them in descending order starting with the best response. I do not have the time, the patiences or the space to try and list them all, from British, French, Japanese, etc, to an unbelievable number of US pubs.

They come in online only, print only and print and online such as *American*. and *Popular Photography* and *Outdoor Photographer*. What I did see, in both the magazines I subscribe to or receive from Tom, and in doing my research, is that they can be broken down by category.

The categories are roughly as follows: consumer/amateur, professional, fine art and a broad category, specialty magazines such as wedding and printing.

The consumer magazines such as *Popular Photography* and *Outdoor Photographer* have how to's, camera and lens reports, editorials and question-and-answer sections. The articles, illustrated with images, are usually instructional at a basic level as to where and how the photographer made the image.

The Pro magazines cover the same areas as the consumer but at a higher level, in that they make the assumption the reader already knows and understands most of the basic principles of photography and printing. They also tend to be more specific in their subject matter such as *Digital Pro Photo* and *Photoshop User*. Some such as the *Photo District News* and *Shutterbug Magazine* track and report on the latest and greatest in photography and where it is heading.

Fine art magazines are just that. They speak only on the subject of fine art and are usually either black and white or color. Two that I get from Tom are Lens Work and Black and White Magazine. Black and White Magazine has a sister publication Color Magazine. Most fine art magazines solicit portfolios for use in their issues and have interviews with the submitter. The work tends to be pushing the limits and outside of the box, some to the point that I do not understand what the photographer is trying to achieve and what the publisher saw that made them publish the portfolio.

Specialty magazines zero in on one subject such as weddings, documentary, street photography, film and darkroom, etc. If you can name a photo genre there is at least one publication covering that subject.


While I do not always understand what the photographer is trying to do or what the author is trying to get across, I find that looking at the professional and fine art magazines helps me in understanding the how and why of image making. So if the consumer magazines are starting to bore you or are not teaching you, then you may want to move up the ladder and subscribe to an online or print pro or fine art magazine.

to buy this new type of camera but procrastinated until a few friends started using them. The quality and colors of the images were just as good or even better than my Canon DSLR's. The four models that I looked at are: the Fuji X Pro 1, the Nikon mirror less, Canon and the Sony Nex series.

Reviews for the Nikon and Canon were average at best. I could see why these camera giants got poor reviews. Why would Canon and Nikon develop a new camera to compete with the DSLR market? They would be hurting their own sales.

The Fuji and Sony got the best reviews. I decided to go with the Sony and haven't looked back. The Sony Nex 7 has a 24 megapixel chip and ISO can go to 12,800! It has a stacking feature that allows you to take indoor photographs with low ISO's and no flash. And of course, it has a built in HDR feature which I use much of the time.

I can carry the Sony camera body with lens, 3 or 4 extra lenses, small flash unit and batteries all in one small camera bag!!!!!

Now I only use my DSLR for sports photography and that's because I feel more comfortable with it for action shots at this time. But that's about to change. I honestly believe that this new camera format will continue to become more popular within the next few years. The mirror has become obsolete and with it so has the old design of the "DSLR." The only negative is that Sony has a limited number of lenses for this camera at present.

Give the camera a try; you won't be disappointed.


PHOTOGRAPHIC EXHIBIT
