Fall is here so winter is right around the corner, time to pack up the camera gear and settle in. Its too cold outside, there's nothing to shoot, there's no color, everything is so bleak and bland. Whats that? You don't want to wait for spring to start shooting again? Well, maybe I was a little premature with all this talk of packing up the camera. There are actually lots of winter photographic opportunities to be had, we just have to look a little harder and be a little more creative.

Outside shooting

Your first option is to just brave the elements and head outside. Now, it is true that it might be harder to find exciting shots, after all, we don't have the colors of spring, summer and fall to work with. Winter gives us a more monotone environment in which to shoot. So be creative, look for abstracts or non-traditional shots. Plus, if we get a snow storm you can find some images which are every bit as beautiful as ones you might find during the spring, summer and fall.

If you are going to shoot in the cold one thing you should keep in mind is that cold temps are an enemy of battery life. If you are going to cary a spare battery, don't keep them in your camera bag, if you do you will find them depleted partially or fully even before you use them. Keep them in a pocket that is close to you body. This will help to keep your batteries warm and keep them from losing their charge before you get to use them.

Shoot at Home

If you don't feel like venturing out into the cold you can try your hand at shooting indoors by creating your own photography work space inside. Winter is a great time to work on still life or macro photography. Pick up some flowers at a local florist and set them up in a vase near a window for great natural light. For softer light cover the window with a translucent plastic shower curtain, it will diffuse

Follow these rules when submitting any image to the Coastal Camera Club:

Files must be named using the following format:

X#\$Coastal\$LastName\$FistName\$ImageTittle\$YYYY-MM.jpg

Where X=the type of file (Open, Digital Art, Black&White, etc) and YYYY-MM is the year and month of the event for which you are submitting the file. For example, O2\$Coastal\$Smith\$John\$The Red Barn\$2011-01, this is an image titled *The Red Barn* by John Smith of the Coastal Camera Club to be submitted to a competition in January of 2011.

Please remember the maximum size for competitions is 1024 pixels wide by 768 pixels tall. If the files are to be used in a club critique, they can be full size.








EXHIBIT AT THE FLORENCE GRISWOLD MUSEUM

White on White: Churches of Rural New England

October 5, 2012 through January 27, 2013

Organized by Historic New England, White on White presents over 40 photographs by renowned architectural photographer Steve Rosenthal depicting iconic New England meetinghouses and churches. To complement the images of churches in Brooklyn and Old Lyme, Connecticut, that were part of the original exhibition, Florence Griswold Museum Curator Amy Kurtz Lansing asked the artist to photograph additional churches for this exhibition. Images of churches in Madison, Lyme and East Haddam, and a new photo of the Old Lyme First Congregational Church, celebrate these buildings that give New England towns and villages a unique sense of place and define, in many minds, the New England character. An introductory video about the White on White project accompanies the exhibition.
