## View from the Boardroom

Have you asked yourself this question? Will better gear make me a better photographer? You probably know the answer is no, the equipment you use has little to do with your skills or creativity. Of course as your skills improve you will probably want better gear.

But many photo enthusiasts and photographer wanna-bes do think upgrading their stuff is going to make them better photographers. Let's look at this perception.

Suppose we give an amateur and a professional the same run of the mill P&S camera and send them out to shoot some street scenes. Who do you think will come back with the better photos? Which one would be considered the better photographer? Do you think if we gave the amateur a \$2000 camera and left the pro with the \$200 P&S, the amateur would come back with better images? Hard to say, but it's doubtful (especially since newer P&S cameras are getting better all the time!).

Now suppose we compare the amateur's images from the P&S to his photos from the advanced camera. The second set may be better; sharper, better exposed, nicer color. The amateur might conclude that the high-end gear has made him a better photographer. (On the other hand, in unskilled hands the more advanced gear may be too difficult to use properly and result in worse looking images compared to the simple P&S.) If we critiqued the two sets of images from the amateur as

### Follow these rules when submitting any image to the Coastal Camera Club:

Files must be named using the following format:

X#\$Coastal\$LastName\$FistName\$ImageTittle\$YYYY-MM.jpg

Where X=the type of file (Open, Digital Art, Black&White, etc) and YYYY-MM is the year and month of the event for which you are submitting the file. For example, O2\$Coastal\$Smith\$John\$The Red Barn\$2011-01, this is an image titled *The Red Barn* by John Smith of the Coastal Camera Club to be submitted to a competition in January of 2011.

Please remember the maximum size for competitions is 1024 pixels wide by 768 pixels tall. If the files are to be used in a club critique, they can be full size.

TIDBITS #89 - STREET PHOTOGRAPHY

Street photography, in my humble opinion does not get the respect it deserves. Since I have been running the Shoreline Arts Alliance's Images photography show I have seen many street images that I would definitely place in the fine art category. I also use the "would I hang it on my wall" test and most street photography passes this test. In this years show we sold more street photography than any other category.

So what is street photography? You can find all kinds of definitions on the web and also a number of sites devoted to the art form. To me street photography is up close and personal taken on the street or in other public spaces, with or without people, that has a story to tell. It can and is usually candid but may also be posed. Garry Winogrand, a well known street photographer in his day considered any venue good for street photography as he loved Coney Island and would haunt any public place he felt he could find subject matter. The Museum of Modern Art in New York has a Winogrand retrospective hanging until September 21, 2014.

Street photography is a good reason to go to the MILC (Mirror-less Inter-changeable Lens Camera), as the body and lenses are much smaller than DSLRs and with a Prime lens (fixed focal length) of 35mm (full frame), 23mm (APS-C), 17mm (Micro 4/3rd) it is also very inconspicuous. If getting that close scares you then go up one level and use a 50mm (full frame), 35mm (APS-C) or 25mm (micro 4/3rd). The prime lenses in this category also tend to be very fast having apertures of f-1.4 or f-1.8, which allows for higher shutter speeds or ISO. Do you have to get prime lenses to do street photography? No, any short zoom lens will do though you will have to contend with their slower aperture, usually a minimum of f-2.8.

I know, with these lenses you have to get really close to your subject, but that is what street photography is all about. www.digital-photography-school.com has an excellent article on street shooting and one of the things they offer is an experiment. You will see how little people really pay attention to other people while on the street. They recommend standing on a busy street corner and play statute, strike a posse. Most people will just walk around you and keep on going. Others may give you a weird look as they pass by but no one will get angry or upset. Another was to walk into an elevator and face to the rear. You may even talk to the people, but again they will ignore you or may even engage in a conversation.

The article also offered 10 points to good street photography.

- 1. A fast prime lens either 35 or 50 mm (full frame equivalent). Why? Less obtrusive and they have a faster aperture as in f-1.4 or f-1.8. This allows you to shoot at higher Shutter Speeds and or ISOs. Also with the wider lenses you can actually capture your subject without pointing the camera directly at them.
- 2. Get up close and personal as in 3 to 10 feet of your subject. With the 35 or 50mm (full frame) you are actually representing in the viewfinder the field of vision of the human eye.
- 3. Never leave home without it. How many times, especially with the large DSLR, have you left it at home only to see something you want to photograph, but had no camera.

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ASK THE BOARD

Chances are if you have a question, someone else has the same one. So don't be shy - start sending in your questions.

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- 4. Disregard what other people think of you, especially if you are in a strange city by yourself. Do we really care what they think?
- 5. Smile, it is amazing what you can get away with if you smile. Also, if they see you taking their picture, don't turn away but, acknowledge them with a nod of the head or a tip of the hat, and a smile. At the same time if you see that they do not want their picture taken, and you will know, then don't!
- 6. While street photography usually is done on the fly, if you do see an interesting person and a nice back drop, ask if they would mind posing for you.
- 7. Be respectful of others. This goes for people moving around you, don't block the sidewalk, but most importantly your subject. This is especially true of the homeless or down and out. "Think about why you are taking the shot". If it tells a story then by all means go for it, but if all you are doing is getting the shot leave it be.
- 8. Look for juxtaposition, conveying humor, irony, beauty among the ugly or signs and people.
- 9. Tell a story.
- 10. Just go for it, and remember smile.

I took this directly from the website.

"So 35mm or 50mm?

As you can see, there are both advantages and disadvantages to the use of these two focal lengths. None of them stands as better then the other one. Ultimately, it will come down to your shooting style preference and your personality, so ask yourself the following kind of question might:

- do you like to get very close to people? (35mm)\*
- do you shoot mainly portraits of people in the street? (50mm)
- do your prefer large depth of field (35mm) to blurred backgrounds? (50mm)
- do you live in an environment with narrow streets (35mm) or a lot of wide open space? (50mm)
- or even, are you tall?
- \* I have added the focal lengths.

If still undecided, you could carry both the 35 and 50mm focal lengths. I don't recommend it though. These focal lengths are close in field of view so it will be easier to make the two steps forward or backwards instead of losing time in a lens swap."
