**Follow these rules when submitting any image to the Coastal Camera Club:**

Files must be named using the following format:

X#\$Coastal\$LastName\$FistName\$ImageTittle\$YYYY-MM.jpg

Where X=the type of file (Open, Digital Art, Black&White, etc) and YYYY-MM is the year and month of the event for which you are submitting the file. For example, O2\$Coastal\$Smith\$John\$The Red Barn\$2011-01, this is an image titled *The Red Barn* by John Smith of the Coastal Camera Club to be submitted to a competition in January of 2011.

Please remember the maximum size for competitions is 1024 pixels wide by 768 pixels tall. If the files are to be used in a club critique, they can be full size.

## TIDBITS #96 - DEPTH OF FIELD

Depth of Field (DoF) is that portion of an image that appears sharp when viewed or printed. In reality there is only one plane in the image that is truly in focus. But in front of and behind that point we have areas that “appear” to be in focus. Depending on lens focal length this will normally be 1/3 in front and 2/3 behind the plane of focus. With some telephoto lenses this may approach 50/50. Using this knowledge there are times that I will select a focal point that is part way into the image knowing that the area in front of the focal point will still appear sharp, but by doing so I have extended the DoF further into the image for a given aperture.

Many years ago, yes it is over ten years since digital came along, we all used film with three sizes. 35 mm, was used in most consumer and pro cameras, and there were also medium format and large format film cameras.

At that time there were two primary and one secondary means of controlling depth of field. First and foremost was subject to film (sensor) distance, second aperture, and a distant third, lens focal length.

With the advent of digital, this has been turned around. We all have used digital point and shoot cameras where everything in the image from the front to the rear was in focus regardless of the aperture and how far we were from the subject. With Micro four thirds and APS-C sensors we can get soft focus and have control over depth of field but still not to the extent of full frame sensors. Of course the why has to be asked.

It all has to do with sensor size. The smaller the sensor, in most point and shoot cameras the sensor is smaller than your little finger nail, the greater the depth of field. As the sensor gets larger, depth of field will get narrower, but, you will gain more control over depth of field. At this point the other three controls then come into play.

As the micro four thirds sensor (18mm X 13.5mm) is 1/2 the size (actually 40% less) of a full frame sensor (36mm X 24mm), to get the same depth of field using aperture only, you will need to open up two stops. A full frame sensor at F 2.8 will have the same DoF as a micro four thirds at F 1.4. FF sensor at F 8 will have the same DoF as MFT at F 4. As the APS-C is 2/3 the size of the full frame, if the FF is at F 4 then the APS-C will have to be at F 2.8-3 to get the same DoF.

With smaller sensors, where this becomes an issue is when we try and reduce the depth of field to blur out the background and occasionally the fore ground in an image. On brightly lit subjects we will have to increase our shutter speed as the larger aperture opening will let in more light. We can also, if necessary, chose to reduce our ISO setting if we do not want to change the shutter speed.

Ok, now that I have confused some of you with the math just realize this, the smaller the sensor the greater the depth of field for a given aperture. And **learn to use your Depth of Field Preview button to see what you have in focus.**

Pay attention to the shape of the shadows-or how they can separate your composition. Use them as subtle,graphic elements to help tell your story. You might even use your flash to create some of your own

**EVENTS FOR WHICH PHOTOS ARE REQUESTED TO BE SUBMITTED.**

<u>Juried Exhibits (2 per year)</u>	Up to 5 entries per exhibit (may be same photos for both exhibits). Matted and mounted, framed prints (at least 8"x10" images).
<u>Hospice Exhibit</u>	3ft x 5ft space provided for prints (matted, mounted & framed). Number is variable dependent on size. May be same images as for juried exhibit.
<u>Critiques (2 per year)</u>	Up to 3 images per event, electronically submitted, for critique meetings. These are images that the photographer thinks may be improved upon in the digital darkroom.
<u>Print Critique</u>	Up to 3 prints (no matting or mounting necessary) for rotating small group critique at the designated meeting.
<u>SECCC Competition</u>	Up to 10 images(combination of print and digital – see rules on website). These images may be the same as used in exhibits and critiques. Should be your very best images.
<u>40 Slide Review</u>	Up to 2 digital images (your best work). Note that only 1 may be chosen depending upon number of club submitters.
<u>Other Events</u>	(The following are outside the formal CCC events, but are available for club members. It is hoped that the submittals for formal events would take higher priority, if available images are limited for an individual member.)
<u>Senior Center Exhibits</u>	(2 per year) Matted, mounted and framed prints – variable in number, depending upon space for any given exhibit.
<u>Friends &amp; Co. Exhibit</u>	Matted, mounted and framed prints – 2 to 3, depending upon number of exhibitors for any given exhibit.
<u>Glennie Nature Exhibit</u>	1 or 2 digital images with a nature theme.
<u>Other Exhibits</u>	There a a number of regional exhibits/competitions which are announced at club meetings or by email which are open to club members at their discretion.
